

CHAPTER 3: Peoples of the Northeast




During the 1500s CE, the Northeast, or Eastern Woodlands, was occupied by Algonquian, Iroquoian, and Siouan peoples.

CHAPTER 4: Peoples of the Southwest




From 100 to 1600 CE, the Ancestral Pueblo lived in the Four Corners area of the Southwest.
