The American flag is another symbol that represents our country.

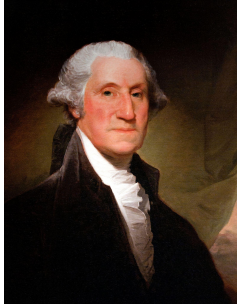
