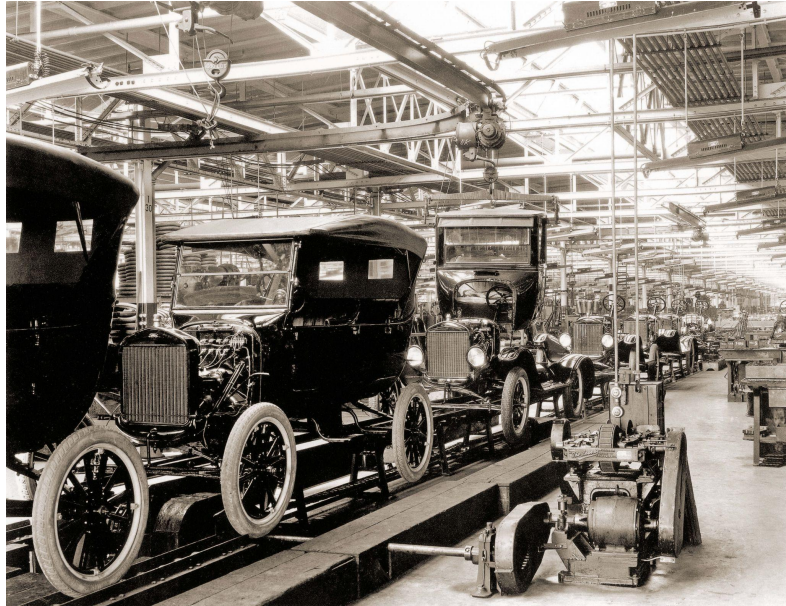

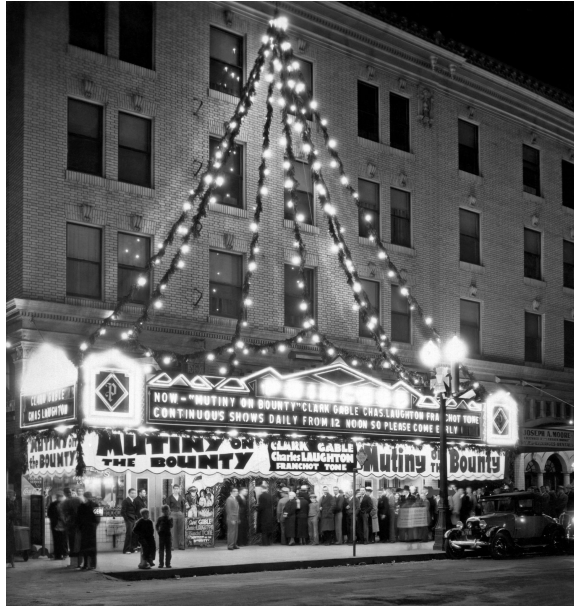


By the 1920s, Henry Ford's assembly line had been adopted in mass production facilities across the country. By 1920, half of all American families owned a car.

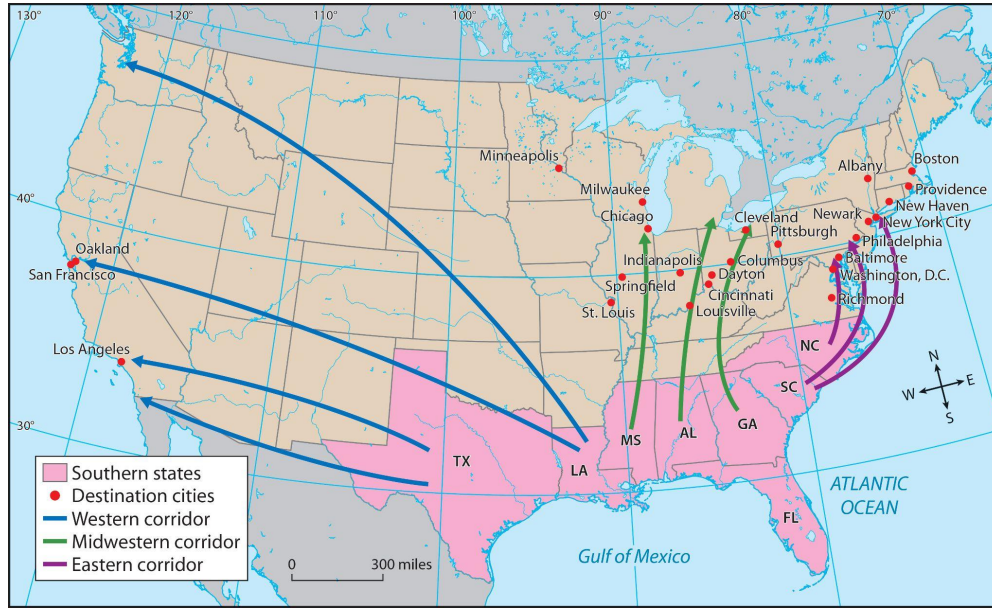


By 1929, radio and movies had become popular across the country, helping to create a common national popular culture.

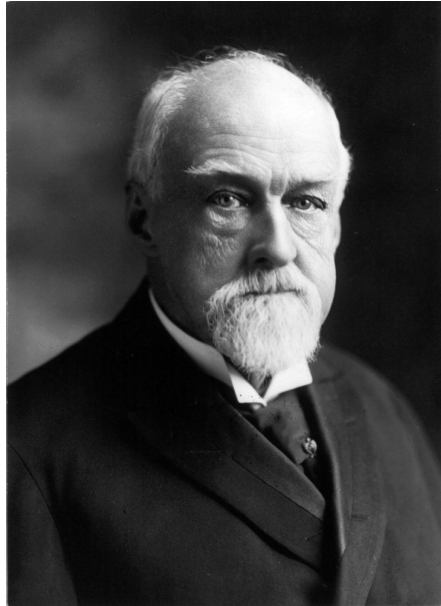

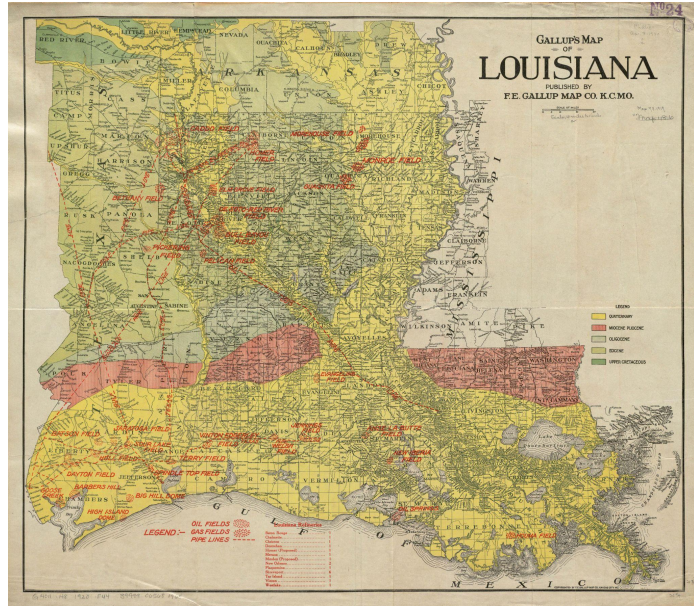
The Bourbon Democrats, such as Governor Samuel McEnery, dominated Louisiana politics in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

By the 1930s, oil and gas had become Louisiana's main industry.

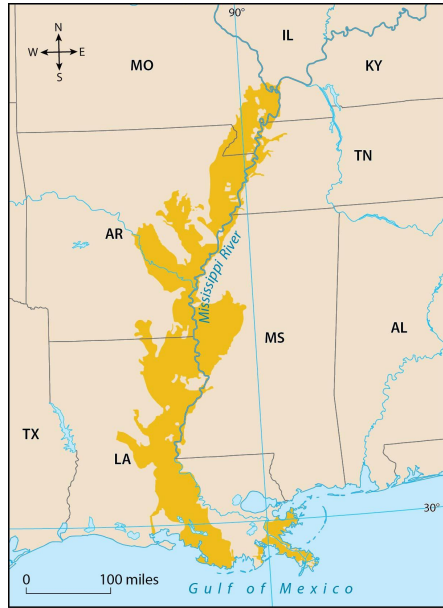

Between 1929 and 1933, President Herbert Hoover addressed the economic collapse with a limited government response that did little to solve the crisis.

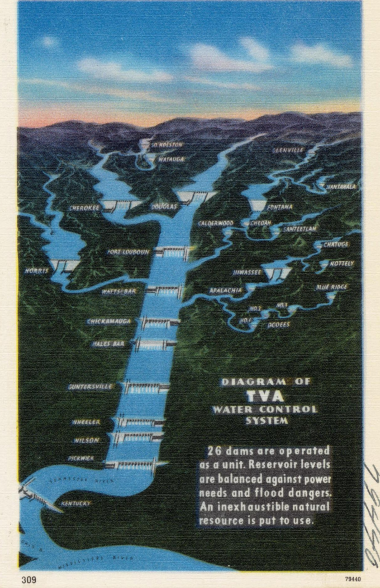
