

Social Studies Whole-Class Instructional Strategy:

Word Wall Displays

The Basics

What? A display of vocabulary words that students can reference.

When? At the beginning of a new unit or topic, or as new words are introduced in texts.

Why? Provides support for learning new vocabulary and creates a record of new words that students can refer to when reading and writing.

How to Implement

- 1. Select an area of the classroom that is visible to all and large enough to display words.
- 2. Before reading a text, select words from the text that will be the focus of vocabulary instruction and write them on the display.
- 3. Introduce and teach the words, engaging students in a discussion of the word meanings.
- 4. After reading the text, ask students to contribute additional words from the text that the teacher did not select.
- 5. Use the wall interactively throughout the year. Encourage students to use words from the display in their writing and speaking, and to continue suggesting additions to the display.
