Accountability High School Fact Sheet: 2014-15 School Performance

As principals lead their schools, from planning to reflection, understanding the accountability system and incentives within it is critical.

Performance on State Assessments

Schools are awarded points based for the performance of students on End-Of-Course exams in English (II and III), math (Algebra I and Geometry, social studies (US History), and science (Biology). Points are awarded in the following manner:

Planning Considerations:

• All students, except LAA 1 students, must take the Algebra I and English II EOC by their third year of high school. If students do not test, they will be assigned a score of zero and be a non-participant in high school testing.

ACT Index

Schools are awarded index points based on the performance of students on ACT. A student's highest score on the ACT through grade 12 is used for accountability purposes, with points awarded in the following manner:

Planning Considerations:

• All grade 11 students must take the ACT; students who do not take the ACT receive a score of 0 in accountability, unless they are LAA1 and the LAA1 designation is denoted on a student's current IEP.



Planning Considerations Spotlight: ACT WorkKeys

Beginning in 2014-15, Louisiana students may take ACT WorkKeys, a nationally recognized workforce readiness assessment. Beginning in 2015-16, WorkKeys will be included in the ACT index for accountability. A concordance table comparing ACT and ACT WorkKeys will be produced in the fall of 2015, after spring 2015 administration.

- > Students in grade 11, particularly those on the Career Diploma pursuing Jump Start credentials will have the option to take WorkKeys, in addition to (not in replacement of), the ACT.
- The Department will analyze the results in the fall of 2015 of students to determine equivalency from the WorkKeys achievement levels (e.g., Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Platinum) to the ACT achievement levels (e.g., 17, 18). Students earning a score of silver or higher will generate points for schools in 2015-16.

Cohort Graduation Rate

The expectation for all high school students is that they graduate in four years. The cohort graduation rate represents the extent to which schools achieve this outcome. Schools earn points in the following manner:

Cohort Graduation Rate (CGR)	Formula
0 to 60 percent graduation rate	CGR X 1.166667
61 to 100 percent graduation rate	(CGR X 2.0) - 50

Planning Considerations:

- A cohort of students is established upon entry as first-time 9th graders.
- Transitional ninth grade students enter the cohort the year immediately following the T9 year.



Strength of Diploma (Graduation Index)

The graduation index is the measure for the extent to which high schools have prepared students for college or a career – with both treated as equally valuable. Schools earn points for students in the following manner:

Planning Considerations:

• For Industry Based Certifications (IBCs), starting with the graduating class of 2017-2018 (2019 SPS), only WIC – approved IBCs will be included as basic statewide credentials.

Progress Points: Performance of Students Academically Behind

Schools may earn points for improvement of students who are academically behind.

Note: 2014-15 policy for earning high schools progress points is under review.
