Lesson Plan

Lesson Objective:

• The learner will demonstrate an understanding of what the FAFSA is and why it is an important form to complete.

Materials:

- Computers and internet access to https://studentaid.ed.gov
- What is FAFSA? worksheet

Introduction:

- The teacher will discuss the importance of financial aid planning by discussing the following points:
 - o In order to receive financial aid, you need to apply for it using the FAFSA.
 - Learning key facts about the FAFSA will ensure that you apply correctly and in a timely fashion.

Instruction:

- Have the students log onto the U.S. Department of Education FAFSA website https://studentaid.ed.gov.
 - O Direct students to click on the "ABOUT US" tab at the top of the page and read through the information.
 - o Give students a few minutes to explore and navigate through other parts of the website.
- Distribute the What is FAFSA? worksheet.
- Students partner up to complete the What is FAFSA? worksheet using information from the website.
- Teacher and students review the answers to the worksheet.

Closure:

- Students will write a reflective journal entry to the following question: "How can I ensure that my parents and I do not miss out on any possible financial aid opportunities for which I am eligible?"
- The teacher will solicit volunteers to share journal entries.
