




Early Childhood Program Leaders

Early Childhood Program Leaders have an opportunity to impact children's success in school and throughout life.

Did you know?

- The average baby's brain doubles in size in the first year. It keeps growing to about 80% of adult size by age 3 and 90% nearly full grown by age 5.1
- The average child under 5 spends 33 hours per week in child care.²
- Children who experience a high quality early education are more likely to graduate from high school, and less likely to require special education classes.³

Early Childhood Programs

Louisiana's early childhood programs prepare children for success in school and life, and the quality of interactions during early childhood help to achieve this goal.

The CLASS™ observation tool measures the quality of interactions and is used to evaluate every publicly funded classroom in Louisiana.

Program Types evaluated by the CLASS™ tool:

- <u>Schools:</u> May offer early learning through LA-4 classrooms, Non-public School Early Childhood Development (NSECD), PreK, Diverse delivery partnerships with child care centers of any type
- Head Start/Early Head Start: Operate stand alone centers and partner with community programs
- <u>Type III Early Learning Centers:</u> Meet state licensing requirements and program assurances with the local community network.

Licensed Early Learning Programs

All early learning centers in Louisiana, including Head Start and Early Head Start, are required to comply with <u>licensing requirements</u>.

There are three types of licenses for early learning centers in the state of Louisiana.

- Type I licenses are for church-based centers and are no longer issued.
- Type II early learning centers do not accept public funding, unless they are nonprofit and eligible for the <u>USDA</u> <u>Food and nutrition program</u>.
- Type III early learning centers are authorized to accept some form of public funding to serve in-need children (Child Care Assistance or CCAP, Head Start funds, or NSECD monies).

Benefits for Type III programs

Type III centers and Head Start must comply with additional requirements related to public funding, and have additional benefits as well.

Head Start and Type III programs are eligible for many benefits:

- <u>Director tax credits</u> based on a center's quality rating or credentials(SRTC)
- <u>Teacher tax credits</u> based on teacher credentials (SRTC)
- <u>Family tax credits</u> for families at Type III early learning centers (SRTC)
- <u>Teacher and Director Scholarships</u> for academic programs related to the field
- USDA food program subsidies
- <u>Child Care Assistance Program</u> bonuses (CCAP)
- Free teacher and director trainings and job-embedded coaching
- Curriculum funding support

A Unifying Vision

Despite differences, all publicly funded programs in Louisiana are evaluated using the *CLASS™* tool which focuses on the quality of teacher-child interactions.

What do high quality interactions with children look like in an early childhood setting?

The dimensions in each domain are best practices in early childhood. Each program receives a rating based on these scores.

CLASS™ Every Day

 $CLASS^{m}$ is not only a **measure** to evaluate quality, it is a **tool** that describes how to achieve it.

Through the CLASS™ trainings and resources, early educators will learn specific best practices to guide every day interactions with children.

Emotional Support focuses on positive, warm and nurturing relationships with children.

Classroom Organization structures classroom routines to function like a well-oiled machine.

Instructional Support describes deep engagement with children to build language and cognitive skills.

Trainings support early education leaders to understand quality interactions to promote high quality in their programs.

CLASS™ Training

There are many resources available to help you learn about the CLASS™ tool.

Understanding quality can help you guide quality and provide guidance to your teachers.

- Your Resource and Referral Agency provides trainings on the CLASS ™ tool.
- <u>Teachstone</u> developed the *CLASS* ™ tool and has an online library of resources, and partners with community Resource and Referral Agencies on more in-depth trainings, like Making the Most of Child Interactions (MMCI).
- Your <u>Community Network Lead Agency</u> has access to a library of rated videos to continue to understand quality interactions.

Developing a High Quality Learning Program

Teachers require skills, materials and support to provide high quality experiences to the children you serve.

There are four key areas that instructional leaders must be informed about to support learning in an early learning program:

- *Teacher Credentials*: Depending on their role in your program, your teachers may be required to complete coursework for a credential.
- Choosing Curriculum and Tools: High quality curriculum provides lessons that sequence learning using <u>Early</u> <u>Learning & Development Standards</u> for children at all levels.
- Child Assessment and Observation Information: Teachers require training, materials and equipment to engage children appropriately to document and guide their learning.
- Ongoing Professional Development: Teachers and Leaders require ongoing training to improve.

Teacher Credentials

Your leadership and your teachers' level of preparation is key to high quality learning experiences for children.

- School-based programs are required to provide a certified lead teacher in each classroom and follow requirements of those individual programs.
- Head Start programs abide by federal guidelines on staffing credentials.
- Type III Early Learning Centers are required to employ a lead teacher with an Early Childhood Ancillary Certificate within 24 months of their start date as a lead teacher starting July 1, 2019.

For the EC Ancillary, teachers may have credentials that apply to the certificate **or** they may need to enroll in coursework. This document is helpful to use when hiring new teachers and determining the next steps for existing staff.

<u>Scholarships</u> are available to qualifying teachers and administrators in Type III and Head Start programs.

Choosing Curriculum

Teachers need the right tools to guide children's learning. The program leader's choice of curriculum will provide direction for teachers each day and throughout the year.

The LDOE has reviewed and rated different early childhood curriculum.

- High quality curriculum are called Tier 1. All early childhood sites should seek to implement a Tier 1 curriculum.
- A list of Tier 1 curriculum is available here. Your Resource & Referral Agency may have some materials onsite.
- Type III early learning centers can receive funding and assistance to purchase and implement a Tier 1 curriculum through the Child Care Curriculum Initiative.

Child Assessment and Observation Information

All early learning programs are required to gather and record assessment information on every publicly-funded child they serve.

As teachers engage with children, they are able to observe children's growth against expectations. In Louisiana, each early learning program uses an online system called GOLD® by Teaching Strategies for publicly funded children.

- A child's progress is used with the curriculum to guide ongoing learning.
- This information can also help identify children who are in need of early intervention services through Early Steps (for children through age three), or from the local school system (over age three).
- This <u>document</u> provides an overview for how GOLD® is used in early childhood classrooms.

Ongoing Professional Development

Teachers and leaders require ongoing training specific to early learning to continuously grow and improve.

There are resources to assist program leaders in selecting quality professional development.

- Type III early learning centers must meet minimal <u>licensing requirements</u> for annual training and are required to receive training from <u>certified Pathways trainers</u>.
- Your Community Network may offer trainings for leaders on informational topics.
- Resource and Referral Agencies support early learning educators through a variety of offerings:
 - -Site-based coaching and technical assistance
 - -Community trainings on key topics, including those shared in this webinar
 - -Site-based training based on staff needs

CLASS™ Observations: What to expect

Each program receives a minimum of two *CLASS*™ observations each year: one in the fall, and one in the spring.

Reliable *CLASS*™ observers from your community network conduct classroom observations. Sites may also receive observations from the ULL Picard Center.

Scheduling: These visits may or may not be announced.

Duration: Observations last two hours.

<u>Feedback:</u> Teachers and site leaders will receive feedback within ten days from the <u>Community Network Lead Agencies</u> or within two days from the ULL Picard Center (on the online portal). These results provide valuable information on areas for professional growth for teachers.

The <u>CLASS observation page</u> on the Louisiana Believes website can provide you with more information.

Classroom Ratings

CLASS™ observations are scored on a seven-point scale. Each site receives a rating based on the fall and spring observations. 2018-2019 scores will reflect five performance levels.

CLASS™ Score Range	Performance Rating	Star Rating
6.00 - 7.00	Excellent	5 stars
5.25 - 5.99	High Proficient	4 stars
4.50 - 5.24	Proficient	3 stars
3.00 - 4.49	Approaching Proficient	1 & 2 stars
1.00 - 2.99	Unsatisfactory	0 stars

- The state average for 2017-2018 was 5.03 (Proficient).
- Unsatisfactory programs are at risk for losing funding and are undergoing intervention to improve.


The results from the CLASS™ observations are shared publicly as part of each site's Performance Profile. Performance Profiles are posted on Louisiana School and Center Finder each fall.



Families and providers can utilize the search feature to look for the information and Performance Profile of a particular site.



Each site will have an "About Our School" page that has general information, such as phone number, address, and hours of operation. Type I and II centers are also listed without performance data.


Louisiana School and Center Finder "Academic Performance"



Each Performance Profile also contains Informational Metrics that are reported by each site once a year in GOLD:

- Assessment information
- Classroom ratio
- Curriculum quality
- Teacher degrees & certifications

This rating determines a Type III
program's School Readiness Tax
Credits.

This score is calculated from CLASS™ observations. It provides information on how the Rating is calculated and how the site compares to the network

Louisiana Early Steps provides infant and toddler screenings for children who may have a developmental delay.
