


The Importance of Using An Early Childhood Curriculum

Activity 1: An Infant Lesson Plan

Follow the Ball

Most babies can begin to track objects with their eyes at 2 months. This is an important skill because children need to track with their eyes to develop hand and eye coordination tasks.

Learning Objectives:

- Looks at and follows faces and objects with eyes
- Demonstrates persistence in learning and discovery

What would be some activities that an infant teacher could use to develop this skill throughout the day? What should the teacher do if the infant is having difficulty with the task?

The word *curriculum* brings to mind a formal, rigid classroom setting.

However, curriculum in terms of the needs of infants and toddlers is

- Blended content and teaching style
- Embedded within a child development focus by the teacher




What is Curriculum?




A quality curriculum will include some of the following components

- Thematic teacher guides
- Literature library
- Music collection
- Manipulatives
- Posters and activity cards
- Assessment
- Family connection materials

What Is Curriculum?




Curriculum is a tool to support the teacher by addressing learning domains, and defining developmental goals.

- Planned high-quality learning experiences or activities can extend infant/toddler learning and skill level
 - These activities should be based on the child's interests, abilities, and individual schedule

How to Use Curriculum


How to Use Curriculum



Curriculum promotes responsive exchanges and supportive relationships through

- Organized activities can target desired learning and skill development outcomes
- Children's responses to learning content or skill development can direct individualized support and improve teacher-child exchanges

How to Use Curriculum




Curriculum can be used to assess and plan additional support based on children's progress


- Curriculum content embedded in learning activities provides
 - Learning outcomes and skill development
 - Opportunities to individualize the redelivery of content based on student needs

Curriculum is a resource guide to provide teachers with appropriate content and activities

- Supports a strength-based approach to learning
 - Reflect on your teaching practices
 - List your strengths and areas that need improvement
 - Address areas of needs with your strengths




- Encouraging a play-based approach
 - Educators engage in play with children while introducing new concepts and modeling language
- Providing continuous learning opportunities for engaged learning
 - Encourage classroom collaborative activities
 - Seize a teachable moment



Supports teachers' understanding of child development within supportive relationships

- Provides a guide for identifying goals that related to children's interests and promotes child development
- Provides resources for activities that facilitate learning experiences and builds off of prior learning
- Supports daily high-quality experiences for children

Activity 2: A Toddler Lesson Plan

Create A Path

Young children use the information obtained through their senses to develop knowledge in their brains. The more opportunities that mobile infants and toddlers have to participate in sensory activities (e.g., seeing, hearing, touching, smelling, and tasting) allows development and understanding of their environment.

Learning Objectives:

- Uses the senses to investigate the environment
- Crawls into, over, and around objects
