ACT: Raising Expectations for Students


In 2013, Louisiana became the 10th state in the country to give all high school students the opportunity to take ACT series of tests free of charge. The ACT initiative is a fundamental part of Louisiana's plan to provide all students a pathway to college or a professional career, assisting students on both the TOPS University pathway and the Jump Start TOPS Tech pathway. ACT tests:

- Measure performance on nationally recognized content standards;
- Create greater college and technical training access for disadvantaged students;
- Provide schools with college- and career-readiness information

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
- In 2014, 1,472 more high school seniors scored an 18 or higher on the ACT than did in 2013, allowing each to attend college without needed remediation.
- The increase since 2012 is 5,253 students.
- The increase in students scoring 17 or higher since 2013 is 1,732, allowing each student to be eligible for TOPS Tech, TOPS Honors, or TOPS Opportunity.
- The increase since 2012 is 6,339 students.
