## **Supporting Diverse Learners English Language Arts**

The goal of English language arts (ELA) is for all students to read, understand, and express their understanding of complex, grade-level texts.

ELA instruction for students who persistently struggle should help students access the Tier 1 curriculum content by focusing on the following:

- 1. Read: Build reading skills, such as reading fluency, with texts used in core instruction.
- 2. Understand: Build understanding by focusing on background knowledge and language that is directly connected to the texts used in core instruction.
- 3. Express Understanding: Build oral and written language skills to express understanding clearly and coherently.

Build Foundational Skills	Supports within the Curriculum (grades K - 5)  • Reinforce foundational skills during reading.
	<ul> <li>Intervention (grades 3 - 5)</li> <li>Administer a screener from the Tier 1<sup>1</sup> K-2 foundational skills curriculum used in your district. Conduct lessons from the K-2 foundational skills curriculum based on results. Monitor student progress using the recommended screener from the curriculum.</li> </ul>
Build Fluency	<ul> <li>Supports within the Curriculum (grades 2 - 12)</li> <li>Before reading, listen to the text read aloud and follow along with a printed version of the text.</li> <li>Before reading, engage with a partner in a fluency practice protocol with fluency words and phrases.</li> <li>While reading, engage in partner reading, choral reading, or echo reading.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Intervention (grades 2 - 12)</li> <li>Have a weekly fluency practice passage from a text in the unit and/or a text related to the unit topic.</li> <li>Conduct the supports from within the curriculum in a small-group setting.<sup>2</sup></li> <li>Conduct timed repeated readings with a passage from a text in the unit and/or a text related to the unit topic.</li> </ul>

Build Background Knowledge	<ul> <li>Supports within the Curriculum (grades K - 12)</li> <li>2-3 weeks before the unit, have students read texts (can include videos) about the unit topic that are written in their home language or on their reading level.<sup>3</sup></li> <li>Set up an accountable choice reading program with the curriculum; have students select their own texts to read related to the unit topic and respond to standards-aligned questions about the texts in writing.</li> <li>Intervention (grades K - 12)</li> <li>Conduct the supports from within the curriculum in a small-group setting.</li> <li>As some students get teacher-led small-group instruction, other students can engage in choice reading.</li> </ul>
Build Language Sense (Meaning)	<ul> <li>Supports within the Curriculum (grades K - 12)</li> <li>Engage in the mentor sentence protocol to make connections between structure and meaning.</li> <li>Engage in a vocabulary protocol with words from unit texts.</li> </ul> Intervention (grades K - 12)
	Conduct the supports from within the curriculum in a small-group setting.

Express Understanding		
Language Skills	<ul> <li>Supports within the Curriculum (grades K - 12)</li> <li>Practice and use conversation stems and teacher talk moves when engaging in conversation.</li> <li>Engage in the mentor sentence protocol, identify the structure of mentor sentences, create sentence frames, and use the sentence frames to write about the text.</li> <li>Use sentence frames and organization models as students write responses.<sup>4</sup></li> <li>Show strong and weak examples of student writing and discuss what makes the strong examples strong and how to improve the weak examples.</li> <li>Use the sentence strategies from The Writing Revolution.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Intervention (grades K - 12)</li> <li>Conduct the supports from within the curriculum in a small-group setting.</li> </ul>
