Margaret Acree earned a Bachelor of Science in mathematics and a Master of Education in curriculum and instruction with a concentration in gifted education from the University of Louisiana at Monroe. She has been a mathematics teacher for 19 years, with the last 13 years at Sterlington High School in the Ouachita Parish School District. She currently teaches Algebra II, precalculus and calculus to tenth—twelvth grade students. Margaret has also taught sixth- through eighth-grade mathematics, including geometry and various levels of algebra. Margaret promotes excellence in mathematics education working with colleagues throughout the school, district, state, and nation. She serves as department head in her school and in a number of capacities at the district level that include leading in-services, textbook adoption and alignment committees, and new initiatives. She presents at conferences sponsored by the Louisiana Association for Teachers of Mathematics (LATM) and the Southern Region Education Board (SREB). She is a member of LATM and National Council for Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM).
