Effective Lesson Planning with Eureka

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Objectives

- Describe the steps of effective lesson planning with Eureka
- Identify opportunities in current structures for teachers to do effective lesson planning, barriers to effective planning, and next steps

- 1. Use the <u>Louisiana Guide for Implementing Eureka</u> and Eureka guidance to determine what standard(s) this lesson focuses on.
 - Define the standard(s) in your own words.
 - Identify the component(s) of rigor of the standard(s).

2. Annotate the lesson.

- Work every problem.
- Review the "Concept Development" or "Classwork" piece. Write the 2-3 key student understandings on the side of the page.
- Determine what problems or sets of problems can be omitted.



- Determine strategies for instruction (whole class <WC>, group work <GW>, individual work <IW>).
- Think through hot spots in the lesson, or places that students are likely to get stuck.
 Determine a plan to support students learning.
- Think through ideal answers and how you will push students to explain their thinking and think deeper about a problem or idea.
- Review "Student Debrief" or "Closing."
 - Identify desired reflections and possible opportunities for clarification

- 3. Determine how you will support students who miss the exit ticket items.
 - Use the <u>remediation guides</u> to determine what standards serve as the foundation of the targeted standard(s).
 - Identify resources to use for targeted remediation.
 - <u>EAGLE</u>
 - Illustrative Mathematics
 - LearnZillion
 - Determine the plan and time structures in which you will address misconceptions or gaps.

Effective Lesson Planning

In summary, to effective lesson planning in Eureka involves:

- 1. Identifying and digging into the targeted standard(s)
- 2. Annotating the lesson
- 3. Establishing remediation needs and approaches

*Front-end planning for modules is also important. Eureka provides Module Overviews and other tools that give overall guidance for each module.
