Hello! I'm Michelle Webb, a Kindergarten teacher at North Desoto Lower Elementary School in Desoto Parish. I was inspired to become a Teacher Leader Advisor (TLA) after attending the first Bayou Bridges session at the 2026 Teacher Leader Summit. I'm excited to bring that energy back to my school and parish and to help create <u>resources</u> that support Social Studies teachers across Louisiana.

Since becoming a TLA, I've realized how important elementary social studies is for building a strong foundation of social studies content knowledge. Using the <u>Bayou Bridges Teacher and Student Materials</u> created by the LDOE in partnership with Core Knowledge has made my classroom more engaging and effective. The teacher notes and embedded questions assist with pacing, ensure that key concepts are addressed, and support students' success on performance tasks.

Currently, the LDOE is developing K–2 Social Studies Knowledge Building Cards designed to explicitly teach important social studies core vocabulary through engaging, student-friendly tools that support understanding and the development of content vocabulary. This

approach supports language acquisition, as described in Scarborough's Reading Rope model (2001), by enhancing both language comprehension and word recognition skills. Knowledge Building Cards help young learners make meaningful connections to topics by integrating words with experiences and building academic language as they engage with social studies content. Students deepen their understanding of history, civics, and geography while supporting better reading comprehension across all subjects. These cards will be available for grades K-2 in the 2026-2027 school year.

I'm thrilled to continue my work as a TLA and help students connect with social studies in meaningful ways! Helpful <u>instructional resources</u> are available for teachers of all subjects. Explore the resources available to help students make meaningful connections in all content areas.

NUMERACY RESOURCES

Math Leader Community of Practice

The LDOE, in partnership with the Charles A. Dana Center, is launching a <u>Community of Practice for Math Leaders</u> to strengthen math teaching and coaching across Louisiana. Through this initiative, participants will connect and collaborate with math leaders from across the state and share best practices and coaching strategies for implementing High-Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM) more effectively in their work.

Beginning in January 2026, participants will meet virtually for two hours each month and will conclude their experience with a special session at the <u>2026 Teacher Leader Summit</u>. K-3 Numeracy Screener

The LDOE is implementing the K–3 Numeracy Screener in alignment with <u>Act 650 (2024)</u> and <u>Bulletin 118</u>. The 2025–2026 school year serves as a learning year before full implementation in 2026–2027.

School systems completed the Beginning-of-Year (BOY) screener within the first 30 days of school and should now prepare for the Middle-of-Year (MOY) window in December.

The best preparation is strong core math instruction and clear communication about the screener's purpose, which is to identify students needing support, not to measure mastery of all standards. Viewing it as a comprehensive assessment may misrepresent student progress and hinder long-term success. Visit the Numeracy Screener web page for more information.

Louisiana Achievement in Numeracy Act (LANE)

Per <u>Act 260 (2023)</u> and <u>Act 353 of 2025 (LANE</u>), all K–8 math teachers must complete an LDOE-approved numeracy course. School and system leaders must collect proof of completion from all new hires teaching these grades. An optional numeracy course for high school math teachers is also available.

Teachers can access courses through the 2025–2026 school year, and system contacts have received the course codes. <u>Guidance and Framing</u> information is available on the <u>Louisiana Math web page</u>. Systems should actively support teachers in meeting these requirements. Numeracy leaders are invited to join monthly office hours on December 17 at 9 a.m.

SUPPORT FOR DIVERSE LEARNERS

Dyslexia Core Assessment Program Update

<u>Louisiana Act 517</u> (2024) established a statewide pathway for identifying and supporting students flagged as "at risk" for dyslexia. The LDOE is preparing for the launch of an online application portal, which will allow families to apply for up to \$500 in reimbursement for a dyslexia core assessment conducted by an <u>approved vendor</u>. The LDOE will share additional guidance and school communication tools ahead of the program's January 2026 launch.

Crisis Prevention Institute

Louisiana Act 479 (2025) revised Louisiana's requirements for the use of seclusion and restraint. In alignment with these updates, the LDOE has partnered with the Crisis Prevention Institute (CPI) to ensure districts receive guidance on the safe use of restrictive interventions, including appropriate safety practices throughout any seclusion or physical restraint event.

To support districts without currently certified CPI instructors, CPI is offering de-escalation and Nonviolent Crisis Intervention training. Eligible schools may register two staff members to become Certified Instructors.

Updated Digital Literacy Guidance

The LDOE published updated <u>Digital Literacy Guidance</u> to support educators in integrating technology purposefully into instruction.

This document serves as a flexible framework, not a curriculum, intended to support schools in modeling technology use at the appropriate grade level. The guidance outlines digital literacy target skills organized by grade band (K-2, 3-5, 6-8, and 9-12) across eight Core Competencies, including

- Computational Thinking & Problem Solving
- Creativity & Innovation
- Information & Data Literacy
- Collaboration & Communication

- Digital Citizenship & Ethics
- Cybersecurity & Online Safety
- Technology Operations & Concepts
- Artificial Intelligence & Emerging Technologies

To make planning easier, the document includes specific subject area connections for mathematics, ELA, science, social studies, and health education. Whether it is K-2 students using drawing apps to express ideas or high schoolers analyzing the societal impacts of AI, this guidance helps connect the Louisiana Student Standards to essential digital skills.
