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## Principal Strategy Spotlight

**Jennifer Burris, 2026 Principal of the Year Finalist**



As principals, we all know the daily tug-of-war between management and instruction. It is so easy to get caught chasing every operational “squirrel” that darts across our path. Before long, we realize we have wandered deep into the woods, far from the classrooms where our leadership truly makes an impact.

Our school's recent LEAP success didn't come from a single big initiative or quick fix. It was the product of steady, intentional work, focused on continuous improvement and capacity building. The truth is, if we want to spend more time in classrooms, we have to trust others to carry part of the load. That means developing confident, capable leaders across our campus.

At Benton Intermediate, our approach centers on distributed leadership. It is not about delegation; it's about empowerment. When we pour into our people, we multiply our leadership impact.

We start by setting clear expectations and systems for support, especially for new teachers. Our New Teacher Orientation and Induction Program, led jointly by our instructional coach and teacher leaders, ensures every new staff member knows what great instruction looks like on our campus. We use an “always, sometimes, and never see” framework to make expectations transparent and actionable. From day one, new teachers are integrated into their Teacher Collaborative (TC) groups, providing them with a professional home base and instant access to shared expertise.

These TCs are truly the heart of our continuous improvement process. They are not just meetings; they are where growth happens. Teachers plan together, analyze data, and learn from each other every single week. Professional development isn't something we "do" on a special day; it's part of our environment.

We have also structured leadership so that each administrator is assigned to a specific content area, allowing for more focused and intentional support: attending team meetings, conducting observations, creating coaching plans, and participating in professional development. This structure keeps us closely connected to the daily work of each department, giving us a clear understanding of emerging needs, strengths, and challenges. Because we are embedded in the work, we can more accurately identify instructional priorities for ILT, ensure coaching is truly responsive, and support teams with a level of depth that just is not possible when leadership is spread thin.

Another way I'm able to reclaim time is by avoiding a one-size-fits-all approach to teacher support. Just like students need differentiated instruction, our teachers need differentiated support. We use walkthrough data to assign teachers to tiers, and the tier determines the frequency of walkthroughs and feedback. This system allows me to focus my time and energy where it is needed most, providing intensive support for those who need it while maintaining consistent oversight for the rest. By targeting my efforts, I can maximize impact without spreading myself too thin, ensuring that every teacher receives the guidance that will drive both their growth and student success.

The payoff is a staff that feels confident, capable, and connected. A school where leadership is shared, not siloed. And a principal who can finally spend less time chasing squirrels and more time growing great teaching and learning.

### **New Unit Study and Lesson Preparation Protocols**

New [Unit Study](#) and [Lesson Preparation Protocols](#) outline best practices in planning for math instruction. The tools are designed to help teachers make the most of high-quality instructional materials.

At their core, these protocols help teachers do four things well:

- clarify the specific learning goals tied to the standards
- anticipate where students may struggle or hold misconceptions
- study how lessons connect within a unit and across units, so instruction feels coherent
- highlight key tasks, questions, and strategies with which every student should engage

Use of the new Unit Study and Lesson Preparation Protocol allows teachers to come into planning with a shared understanding of what matters most, strengthening collaboration during planning and team meetings. Ultimately, this leads to more consistent pacing, higher student engagement, and stronger outcomes in every classroom. Funded through The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and [Medicine's Gulf Research Program](#), [Greauxing STEM Stewards \(GSS\)](#) supports Louisiana educators in developing high-quality, open educational STEM resources. As part of the grant, the GSS Fellowship, developed in partnership with [Louisiana Sea Grant](#), engages teachers from across the state in creating place-based STEM experiences that connect students to local aquaculture career pathways. The open-source aquaculture curriculum for grades 6–8 incorporates experiential learning through a new Environmentally Controlled Agriculture (CEA) facility where students explore aquaculture, hydroponics, and sustainable agriculture with real-world data and technology.

### Unleash Innovation with the Presidential AI Challenge

Get ready to inspire the next generation of innovators! [The Presidential AI Challenge](#) is a new national competition that invites K-12 students and educators to solve real-world problems using artificial intelligence. This is a fantastic opportunity for students of all backgrounds to unleash their creativity and develop essential skills for the future.

The challenge is open to students and educators across all grade levels, with four distinct categories for participation:

- Elementary (Grades K-5): Open to classrooms or groups led by an educator or community leader.
- Middle School (Grades 6-8): Open to teams of 1-4 students with a supervising adult.
- High School (Grades 9-12): Open to teams of 1-4 students with a supervising adult.
- Educators (K-12): Open to teams of 1-3 educators.

Teams can choose a project track that best fits their interests and skills:

- Youth Teams can choose between two tracks:
  - Track I (Proposal): Develop a detailed proposal explaining how AI could be used to solve a specific community problem.
  - Track II (Technical/Implementation): Build an actual AI-powered solution, like an app or website, that addresses a community challenge. 8
- Educator Teams (Track III) will either design an innovative approach to teaching an AI concept to students or develop an AI-based tool to enhance classroom efficiency or communication.

Registration is already open. All projects must be submitted by **January 20**.

## Safe and Healthy Schools

### 2025 - 2026 High School Coaches CPR, First Aid, and AED Certification Survey

[Act 95](#) of the 2024 Regular Legislative Session states that beginning in the 2025-2026 school year, any high school employee serving as a coach for the school shall obtain and maintain certification in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), first aid, and the use of automatic external defibrillators (AEDs). The certification shall be consistent with the guidelines of the American Heart Association, American Red Cross, or other nationally recognized, evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care organizations.

Funding is available to assist school systems and schools in complying with the statute.
