


Executive Guidance

- Create a school safety framework inclusive of the primary stakeholders to provide a recommendation within 30 days on course(s) of action for the Governor's consideration.
 - Organization
 - Funding Considerations
 - Executive Order(s)
 - State Law (new/updates)



Identification of School Safety Stakeholders







- Executive Order No. BJ 13-01 School and Campus Safety
 - State level study group led by State Police to recommend legislative changes
 - Developed
 - Louisiana School and Campus Safety Planning Guide
 - Safety and Security Checklist





- La. R.S. 17:416.16 (2013 HB718/Act50)
 - o Requires school crisis management and response plans
 - Requires annual review
 - Requires annual report to school governing authority
 - Requires safety drill within first 30 days and report
 - Plan for locked doors during instruction
 - School must provide for in service training on plan
 - Provide copy of plan to local law enforcement, superintendent, school board
 - Notification of parents in events
 - o **BESE to adopt rules** requiring non public schools to address school safety





- La. R.S. 29:726.3 Critical Incident Planning and Mapping System (2013 HB212/Act136)
 - Created a statewide critical incident planning and mapping system for nonpublic schools, proprietary schools, and nonpublic colleges and universities
 - Requires that each school provide building information to their local parish
 OHSEP, to be uploaded to the Virtual Louisiana System





US DOE Announced - Grants for School Emergency Management (GSEM). *Goal - Create Highly Effective School Emergency Operations Plans*

- GOHSEP applied with support of DOE / LSP (1 of only 25 states)
 - Developed the Louisiana School Emergency Management Program (LA SEMP)
 - Conducted regional workshops (planning/exercises)
 - Provided comprehensive planning guides
 - Developed training guidelines
 - Developed templates for all requirements







- USDOE Announced Grants for School Emergency Management (GSEM).
 Goal Continue previous LA SEMP efforts
- Awarded to the LDOE in partnership with LSU NCBRT/ACE (National Center for Biomedical Research & Training/Academy of Counter-Terrorist Education).
 - Program goal: provide training and technical assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) for the development and implementation of high-quality school Emergency Operations Plans (EOPs).
 - LSU NCBRT/ACE has provided over 100 unique training opportunities in-person and virtually.
 - Ends September 2023





Louisiana School Safety: 2017-2018

- Louisiana Blue Ribbon Commission on School Safety announced
 - School site assessments completed
- US Announced -DOJ Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) and Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Grants: LSP applied with support of DOE / GOHSEP
 - COPS School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) Grant
 - Improve law enforcement's response to an active threat or crisis
 - o BJA Students, Teachers, and Officers Preventing (STOP) Grant
 - To create a single **anonymous** reporting system







RAVE Panic Button


- Rave Panic Button accelerates emergency response and provides continuous internal communication with faculty.
- Places a 911 call while sending an In-App notification, Text message, and Email allowing school employees to become immediate responders.
- Fully funded by LSP.
- Early Childhood Centers are in discussion with RAVE to be included in Panic Button deployment.
- Applied as a sub-grantee with LCLE to provide an enhancement that will allow Rave to be installed on desktop computers.

Entire Parish LEAs which have Opted Out: Ascension (uses Raptor), Caddo, Red River, Tensas, Winn











Regional RAVE Adoption



- Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and New Mexico have or had statewide RAVE Panic Button deployments ongoing.
- *6/24/22 Oklahoma's Governor signed an Executive
 Order with RAVE Panic Button listed in the legislation.
- *Arkansas recently expanded to options other than RAVE as the schools are responsible for funding the programs now.





Anonymous Reporting

- The Safe Schools Louisiana App is for students in grades 6 through 12; public, private, and charter schools, statewide.
- The Safe Schools App is aimed at preventing an event from occurring through anonymous reporting.
- The app allows students to share what they know with people who can prevent the preventable.
- Applied as a sub-grantee with LCLE to get funding to enhance the current website.






 Safe Schools LA App has had 110,231 visits / hits / downloads received from the anonymous app and web site with at total of 533 anonymous tips.

• Of the **533** anonymous tips, **500** tips were determined to be credible and resulted in a formal response (e.g., intervention teams, SRO, school counselors, school psychologist or other clinical professional).

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Educate to Mitigate

Every superintendent and administrator advocates for safe, secure, and peaceful schools. The Louisiana Center for Safe Schools provides school communities and their school safety partners with quality information and resources by identifying and promoting strategies, promising practices, and programs that support safe schools for all students as part of the total academic mission. After all, Education is the key to opportunity and advancement. Likewise, providing safe and secure learning environments are the core foundation of learning and engagement.

When a school-based emergency occurs, school personnel respond immediately. They provide first aid, notify response partners, and provide instructions before first responders arrive. They also work with community partners and governmental organizations, having responsibilities identified in the school EOPs, to provide a cohesive, coordinated response to events as they unfold. Community partners include first responders - law enforcement, fire service, emergency medical service, and emergency management personnel - as well as public and mental health entities. In conjunction with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, U. S. Department of Education, Louisiana Department of Education, Louisiana Department of Public Safety Services, and Louisiana State Police, the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness set out to create and maintain a School Safety Program to build and/or strengthen capacity at the district and local levels for all-hazards emergency operations planning. Our pursuit is to help ensure school and campus safety and the appropriate response from on-scene staff in the event of an emergency or disaster.

The initiative helps ensure school and campus safety and the appropriate response from on-scene staff in the event of an emergency or disaster. Although many already have High-Quality EOPs in place, this is a chance to improve upon the existing plan you have and help support those school districts and private schools that do not yet have High-Quality EOP.

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First Responders and Resource Officers

Homeland Security begins with Hometown Security

As the world revolves and the future unfolds, complex challenges which threaten our safety and security may arise. Law enforcement officers and emergency response professionals are the primary line of defense for U.S. communities. They are trained and certified in actions of resilience, preparedness, and response capabilities.

School Resource Officers (SRO) are sworn law enforcement officers with arrest authority and additional specialized training for collaboration with school organizations during their assignment. Should a school shooting occur, law enforcement officers are the ones who rush to the scene, neutralize the shooter, assist victims, and secure the site. They are trained in school Safety to act as the first line of defense. Their presence at school facilities and on-campus allows them to build the kinds of relationships with students, faculty, and staff that can prevent or mitigate incidents of school violence.

At a meeting of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission, which was held in the aftermath of the Parkland shooting, Commission members (including the parent of victims) raised specific concerns regarding the school personnel training and their actions during the tragedy. Effective training is critical, making it imperative that schools regularly review training protocols to ensure that every School Resource Officer, School Security Officer, teacher, administrator, and student are as prepared as possible to respond to incidents of school violence within the framework of a comprehensive school safety plan.

- Work through DOE to increase collaboration with local education agencies and review adherence to State law requirements
- Increase utilization of Rave Panic Button and Anonymous Reporting Apps or similar solutions.





- Combine and reference Louisiana Center for Safe Schools website with other State
 Agency and Stakeholder sites focused on School Safety
- Continue School Safety Monthly Collaborative Calls and Framework Meetings
- Continue National School Safety Alliance Monthly Collaborative Calls and serving as NSSA Board of Directors, providing access to Applied school safety resources
- Integrate Department of Homeland Security safety and security resources into the school safety model.
- Expand the National Institute of Justice Comprehensive School Safety Initiative
 Framework into the Louisiana School Safety Model.
