Best Practices

- Use the same platform(s) of communication throughout the entire school year.
- Establish how often updates will be provided (e.g., weekly, bi-weekly).
- Set specific hours of availability for digital communication.

Methods of Structuring Your Communication

- Use bullet points or numbered lists when conveying multiple pieces of information.
- Incorporate images, videos, or GIFs to make communication more engaging, where appropriate.
- It is essential to keep parents informed, but excessive communication can become overwhelming.

Confidentiality

- Never share personal or sensitive information about other students.
- Ensure the tools comply with privacy laws such as FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act).
- If sending a message to multiple parents, use BCC to hide email addresses or use group messaging features on apps without revealing individual contact details.

Addressing Challenges

- Offer guidance or alternatives if parents have trouble accessing or using digital platforms.
- Use translation tools or services when necessary or provide communication in multiple languages when possible.
