Title IV - Part A Student Support and Academic Enrichment Program

Program Overview

The Title IV, Part A (Title IV-A) Student Support and Academic Enrichment Program (SSAE) was authorized under the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act in 2015. The Title IV-A program is intended to improve students' academic achievement by increasing the capacity of states, local education agencies (LEAs), schools, and local communities to:

- (1) Provide all students with access to a well-rounded education,
- (2) Improve school conditions for student learning, and
- (3) Improve the use of technology in order to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students.

Program Administration

LEAs receiving more than \$30,000 must conduct a comprehensive needs assessment and use the results to justify spending requests in all three-program areas in the following way: at least 20 percent for Well-Rounded Education, at least 20 percent for Safe and Healthy Schools, and 15 percent for Effective Use of Technology.

Title IV – A Priority Content Areas

The Title IV – A Program is intended to improve students' academic achievement to:



Support Well-Rounded Educational Opportunities

Ex. Music and arts education, STEM, Accelerated learning programs, etc.



Support Safe and Healthy Students

Ex. Human trafficking, School-based violence prevention strategies, Drug abuse prevention, Bullying and harassment prevention, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)



Support the Effective Use of Technology

Ex. Building technological capacity and infrastructure

SPECIFIC

Reflects an important strategy of what your District seeks to accomplish (Programmatic activities or capacity-building priorities)



MEASURABLE

Includes standards by which reasonable people can agree on whether the goal has been met (by numbers or defined qualities).



AMBITIOUS

Challenging enough that achievement would mean significant progress – a "stretch" for the District.

R

REALISTIC

Not so challenging as to indicate lack of thought about resources, capacity, or execution; possible to track and worth the time and energy to do so.



TIME-BOUND

Includes a clear deadline.

INCLUSIVE

Brings those most impacted by the Title IV, Part A program into processes, activities, and decisions in a way that shares power.



EQUITABLE

Seeks to address systemic injustice, inequity, or oppression.

Sample Title IV – A Specific Program Objectives Need, Activity, Objective and Outcome:

- Prioritize objectives, outcomes and activities based on the Needs Assessment
- Objectives and outcomes should be specific and measurable
- Data quality is accurate, complete, consistent, reliable, and valid

1st - Identify Need

LEA noticed an increase of **100 students** experiencing anxiety, depression, drug use and suicidal thoughts among 8th – 12th graders **based on counselor referrals.** (Data & Data Source Provided)

2nd – Activity

LEA will hire two additional mental health counselors for each of the Title I schools that serve $8^{th} - 12^{th}$ graders. (What are you going to do about it? Target audience)

3rd Objective -

LEA will **increase access** to on-site mental health counselors for $8^{th} - 12^{th}$ graders at Title I schools no later than August 30, 2024 in order to **decrease** the number of students reporting anxiety, depression, drug use and suicidal thoughts. (Goal)

Outcome -

LEA increased the accessibility of school based mental health services to students in grades 8th – 12th. Counselor referrals decreased by 10% in areas of anxiety, depression, drug use and suicidal thoughts during 2024. (What happened?)
