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OVERVIEW

Since the Governor issued the statewide Stay At Home Order in March 2020, early childhood communities, providers, and the Louisiana Department of Education acted quickly to ensure the safety of children and to meet the child care needs of essential infrastructure workers.

However, the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the child care sector are significant. A survey conducted by the Louisiana Policy Institute for Children found the majority of child care providers have reported a loss in revenue, and a significant number of child care providers are facing temporary or permanent closures. Early childhood communities must be equipped to offer child care providers strategic and targeted support to recover.

Additionally, in anticipation of potential facility closures or modified school and center operations in the coming year, early childhood communities and providers should begin making plans to ensure children have the experiences and support they need to develop and grow, regardless of setting.

Louisiana has made considerable progress in unifying and strengthening its early childhood system and has been focused on three key priorities for early childhood: increasing early childhood classroom quality, expanding access for economically disadvantaged families, and supporting local governance. To sustain the progress Louisiana has made as a state and to prepare for a strong start to the 2020-2021 school year, it is critical early childhood communities take steps to support the child care sector in the immediate aftermath of COVID-19 and to ensure children continue to learn and thrive in the long-term.

STRONG START FOR EVERY COMMUNITY

Early childhood communities are composed of early childhood lead agencies, Child Care Resource & Referral (CCR&R) agencies, school systems, Head Start grantee(s), and child care providers, and it is now more critical than ever that these entities work in partnership as the state recovers from the COVID-19 pandemic.

This Early Childhood Strong Start 2020 Planning Framework outlines priorities and funding opportunities in order for early childhood communities and sites to work together to ensure:

- All **child care centers have the tools and resources they need to reopen safely** and in accordance with Office of Public Health guidelines.
- **Communities sustain and/or increase access** to opportunities for early childhood care and education in the near and long-term.
- **Teachers are prepared to lead classrooms and provide high-quality interactions** for children every day.
- **Families are supported to re-enroll** children in early childhood programs, **or to provide quality care and education in their homes** if programs are unable to reopen or remain open.



STRONG START 2020: EARLY CHILDHOOD PLANNING PRIORITIES OVERVIEW

The Planning Priorities outlined below are designed to support early childhood communities and sites as they begin planning to ensure child care centers can safely reopen, communities can sustain and/or increase access, children continue to have high-quality experiences, and families are supported. Communities and sites may be eligible for funding opportunities.

CATEGORY: The four early childhood planning categories include the most critical areas for a strong start: Health, Safety, & Operations; Sustaining & Expanding Access; Classroom Quality & Continuous Learning; and Family Engagement & Support.

PRIORITY: Each category is further subdivided into priorities for communities and sites. These priorities are aligned to the key decisions communities and sites will make for a strong start in 2020-2021. While these priorities are not required, they are recommended for communities and sites.

PRIORITY FUNDING GUIDANCE: Communities and sites may be eligible for several funding opportunities to support their Strong Start 2020 plans. Funding sources include:

- **COVID-19 Community Child Care Recovery Grants:** The Department has released a Request For Applications (RFA) for which lead agencies are eligible. Lead agencies should develop a planning and funding proposal in coordination with their CCR&R and program partners, and funding must be used to fund activities that support child care. - **Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSERF):** Early childhood community networks can also partner with their school system(s) to utilize ESSER funding for early childhood priorities.
- **Lead Agency and Ready Start Network Allocations:** The Department will provide flexibility for lead agencies to use lead agency and Ready Start Network allocations to support COVID-19 recovery efforts and the implementation of the Strong Start 2020 plans.
- **Louisiana Child Care Assistance Provider (LaCAP) Relief Grants:** Child care assistance providers may be eligible for a second round of grant funding to support reopening. Access information regarding [LaCAP Relief Grants](#).

EARLY CHILDHOOD PLANNING CATEGORIES

- 1. HEALTH, SAFETY, AND OPERATIONS:** Early childhood communities and sites plan for maintaining the health, safety and continued operation of early learning centers.
- 2. SUSTAINING AND EXPANDING EARLY CHILDHOOD ACCESS:** Early childhood communities plan to sustain and expand access to early childhood programs for economically disadvantaged families that considers the needs and challenges of, as well as opportunities for, families and child care providers.
- 3. CLASSROOM QUALITY AND CONTINUOUS LEARNING:** Early childhood communities and sites plan to support children's social, emotional, and academic growth through various methods of continuous learning including a plan for high-quality curriculum and professional development.
- 4. FAMILY ENGAGEMENT AND SUPPORT:** Early childhood communities and sites plan to engage and support families, and to help connect them with community, health, mental health, and social services.
