
Selection

- Do you have processes in place when your selection model does not work?




Supports

- How do you address preconceived ideas students may have about working in high poverty schools?



Partnerships

- How do you ensure high quality mentoring?
- How do you select your partner schools?
- How do you get school buy in for your program and it's participants?
- How do you ensure strong communication between university and school site?
- Do you use clustering in your partner schools and if so how has that been beneficial?
- How do you ensure your partners value the development and growth of your candidates over their more immediate needs (like subbing, completing other duties, etc.)




