



Overview of Summer Learning Programs

<u>Summer learning programs</u> (SLPs) are designed to provide students with additional opportunities for learning and growing during the summer months. Systems should strive to create opportunities for all students to access a summer learning program.

Overview of Arts

Arts are an essential part of a well-rounded education and should be embedded in a summer learning program. <u>Louisiana's Arts Standards</u> focus on four disciplines:

- visual arts,
- theatre,
- dance, and
- music.

Best Practices and Approach

The arts make learning come alive! Through each of the four disciplines, teachers should approach planning and instruction through four focus areas.

- **Creative Expression**: Students imagine, interpret, and organize ideas for expression when creating and producing art forms which involve inspiration, analysis, and problem solving.
- **Aesthetic Perception**: Students perceive characteristics of natural environments, respond to aesthetic ideas and experiences, and develop awareness of beauty and meaning of the arts.
- **Historical and Cultural Perspective**: Students recognize the arts as an expression of history and human experience.
- Critical Analysis: Students interpret, analyze, and synthesize performing and visual arts to form opinions.

Summer learning program leaders and teachers should consider the following:

- Plan for equitable access. This includes accessibility, participation, materials and supplies, scheduling
 of instructional time, instructional delivery, and engagement of all disciplines for all students. LEAs who
 decide to offer SLPs to students within it's jurisdiction must also offer the same program access and
 opportunity to participate to students with disabilities, and LEAs must be prepared to provide any IEP
 related modifications or reasonable 504/ADA accommodations.
- Make time for collaboration. Collaboration with all teachers is essential for planning a cohesive summer learning program.
- Create a safe and positive culture. Building culture is key in order for students to participate in an
 environment where they feel comfortable expressing themselves, taking risks, and creating different
 types of art.
- **Provide opportunities for expression.** Students gain exposure where they can read, write, listen, and speak about the arts.
- Seek opportunities to enrich or extend lessons. Reading, math, social studies, and science can be enhanced through the inclusion of arts.
- Offer choice. Students should be offered choice as often as possible to exercise their imaginations and creativity.
