

# **Overview of Summer Learning Programs**

<u>Summer learning programs</u> (SLPs) are designed to provide students with additional opportunities for learning and growing during the summer months. Systems should strive to create opportunities for all students to access a summer learning program.

# **Overview of Literacy**

Literacy is an essential part of a well-rounded education and should be embedded in a summer learning program. Louisiana's K-12 Student Standards for English Language Arts focus on three goals:

- Reading,
- Understanding complex, grade-level texts, and
- Expressing understanding of texts through writing and speaking.

# **Best Practices and Approach**

Literacy connects all learning! With a strong foundation in literacy, students can be successful in other subject areas as well. Guided by the goals of Louisiana's Student Standards, teachers should <u>approach planning and</u> <u>instruction</u> through:

- Setting and monitoring <u>literacy goals</u>.
- Explicit, systematic instruction, interventions, and extension activities.
- Ongoing <u>professional growth</u>.
- Engaging families around literacy development.

School systems that decide to offer SLPs to students within its jurisdiction must also offer the same program access and opportunity to participate to students with disabilities, and school systems must be prepared to provide any IEP related modifications or reasonable 504/ADA accommodations.

## Activities

- Local Library Field Trip
  - Students can get library cards and explore their local library and its available resources and activities.
- Poetry in the Park
  - Have students listen to or read favorite poems while enjoying the outdoors. Have a picnic for more fun!
- Literacy Expositions
  - Allow students and their families to engage with texts and tasks across content through presentations and projects, ensuring content from all subject areas is included.
- Student Partnerships
  - Pair students from different grade levels (one higher, one lower) and host student-led and student-focused book clubs.
- Book Bags
  - To foster reading for enjoyment, provide students with books of various genres, levels, and topics along with enriching literacy activities that are not connected to assessments. Dedicate reading time daily or weekly during the SLP.
