# Parent Guide to Digital Responsibility

#### What is digital responsibility?

o Digital Responsibility is the ability to navigate digital environments in a way that is safe and responsible, and to actively and respectfully engage in these spaces. It is also the understanding that <u>balancing time online and off</u> has value.

## How can I teach my student to be a good digital citizen?

#### **Safety**

Talk with your child about what is safe to share online vs. what should be kept private and who is safe to interact with. Explain what to do if they feel unsafe.

- Show them how to block and report unsafe people on their social media and video games
- o Help them with privacy settings
- Read <u>Faux Paw the Techno Cat</u> books with young children and talk about online safety
- o Set ground rules and maintain open communication
- o Keep/charge tech in common spaces (ex. living room)
- o Know what apps they use

#### Respect

Just like you teach them to use kind words and to be friendly to people they meet in person, tell them the same rules apply online. Always be kind.

- Model what this looks like using real examples from your social media – how do you respectfully disagree with someone?
- o How can you help someone who is being disrespected online?
- Explain which people you are comfortable with them talking to online and why
- Teach respectful phrases to use in different situations

#### Accuracy

Help your child learn to tell the difference between fact and fiction (or embellished stories) online.

- Read the article before you share it, don't share based on the headline alone
- o Check the author to determine if they are a credible source
- Learn about <u>deepfakes</u> and how to identify them and avoid sharing them
- Explain possible consequences that can come from sharing inaccurate information both with regard to social inaccuracies (gossip) and news
